This report covers the period January 2020 to October 2020. The 51st Report appeared in *Ibis* 162: 600-603.

CHANGES TO THE BRITISH LIST

The following changes have been made to the British List.

'Mandt's' Black Guillemot Cepphus grylle mandtii (M.H.K. Lichtenstein)

Add subspecies Cepphus grylle mandtii[†] (M.H.K. Lichtenstein) to the British List One, second-calendar-year or older, Cut End, Witham Mouth, Lincolnshire, 7-10 December 2017.

Published material indicates that *C. g. mandtii* can be distinguished from other subspecies of Black Guillemot. In non-breeding plumage the taxon is generally very pale, having a largely white head, lacking both a dark loral spot and dark ear-coverts, and having an all white rump, scapulars, wing coverts and more white in the primary feathers. A paper describing these features and their analysis in the Cut End bird is being published in *British Birds* (McInerny & McGowan, In Press).

The probability of this individual being an escape from captivity was judged to be minimal. Individuals resembling this taxon have been observed in Iceland, the Faroe Islands and the Netherlands.

Black Guillemot is polytypic, breeding in the North Atlantic, Baltic and Arctic regions to eastern Russia and west to Alaska. Though sedentary in much of its range, birds nesting in higher Arctic latitudes including *C. g. mandtii* move to ice-free seas further south in winter.

IN ADDITION

New British first records:

Following the review and rejection of British first records of White-winged Lark *Alauda leucoptera* and Blyth's Pipit *Anthus godlewskii* from East Sussex during the latter half of the nineteenth century, both associated with the taxidermist Mr. G. Swaysland & Son (*Ibis* 160: 936-942, *Br. Birds* 112: 89-98), five other British first records from the same source, area and period have been reviewed.

These include:

Black-throated Thrush *Turdus atrogularis*

One, male, 23 December 1868, near Lewes, East Sussex, specimen at Booth Museum, Brighton (accession number BoMNH 000102).

Rufous-tailed Scrub Robin Cercotrichas galactotes

One, male, nominate subspecies *C. g. galactotes*, 16 September 1854, Plumpton Bostall, near Brighton, East Sussex, specimen at Natural History Museum, Tring (accession number NHMUK 1859.8.12.1).

Common Rosefinch Carpodacus erythrinus

One, caught late September 1869 near Brighton, East Sussex, held in an aviary until June 1876.

Little Bunting Emberiza pusilla

One, 2 November 1864, Roedean School, Brighton, East Sussex, specimen at Booth Museum (accession number BoMNH 207569).

Rustic Bunting Emberiza rustica

One, 23 October 1867, Roedean School, East Sussex, specimen at Booth Museum (accession number BoMNH 189248, previously listed as 204074).

The review resulted in all five records being rejected and the following records accepted instead as British firsts:

Black-throated Thrush

One, immature male, February 1879 Perth & Kinross, near Perth, Perth and Kinross, specimen at Perth Museum and Art Gallery, Perth (accession number PERGM 1977:778) (*Ibis* 1889: 579; *Transactions of the Perthshire Society of Natural Science* 1: 135-138).

Rufous-tailed Scrub Robin

One, 25 September 1859, near Start Point, Devon, nominate subspecies *C. g. galactotes*, specimen at Natural History Museum, Tring (accession number NHMUK 1859.8.12.1) (*Annals & Magazine of Natural History* 1859 Series 3 Volume 4: 399-400; *Ibis* 2: 103).

Common Rosefinch

One, immature, 3 October 1906, Fair Isle, Shetland, specimen at National Museums Scotland, Edinburgh (accession number NMSZ 1907.4.55) (*Annals of Scottish Natural History* 1906: 236-237; *Annals of Scottish Natural History* 1907: 70).

Little Bunting

One, female, 11 October 1902, Teesmouth, County Durham (*Bulletin British Ornithologist's Club* 13: 14).

Rustic Bunting

One, female, immature, 17 September 1881, Easington, East Yorkshire, specimen deposited at Yorkshire Museum, York, but longer traceable (*The Naturalist* 1881: 57-58; *Zoologist* 1881: 465-466; *Ibis* 1882: 181; *The Naturalist* 1885 (10): 364; *Zoologist* 1884: 176; *Zoologist* 1891: 363).

CHANGES TO THE BRITISH LIST AFTER THE ADOPTION OF VERSION 10.2 OF THE IOC WORLD BIRD LIST

The release of version 10.2 of the *IOC World Bird List* (https://www.worldbirdnames.org) resulted in numerous changes to the British List.

Western Subalpine Warbler *Sylvia iberiae* is given full specific status being split from Eastern Subalpine Warbler *Sylvia cantillans*, with both species moving to the genus *Curruca*.

The new annotation being:

After Sardinian Warbler Curruca melanocephala

Western Subalpine Warbler † A

Curruca iberiae (Svensson) V monotypic.

After Moltoni's Subalpine Warbler Curruca subalpina

Eastern Subalpine Warbler † A

Curruca cantillans (Pallas) V cantillans (Pallas) V albistriata C.L. Brehm.

The sequence of Sylviidae is revised with, for most species, a change in genus from *Sylvia* to *Curruca*:

Ross's Goose Chen rossii

A review of the Category D status of this species is being undertaken.

White-headed Duck Oxyura leucocephala

A review of the Category D status of this species is being undertaken.

Giant Petrel sp. Macronectes giganteus/halli

One, first-calendar-year or older, Whitburn, Co. Durham, 2 July 2019 and same Cullernose Point, Northumberland, 2 July 2019, is being considered as the first record of this species pair.

Brown Booby Sula leucogaster

One, second-calendar-year or older, Swalecliff, Kent, 19 August 2019, is being considered as the first record of this species.

Eastern Yellow Wagtail Motacilla tschutschensis taivana

One, first-calendar-year to second-calendar-year, Pelistry, Kittydown and roaming, St Mary's, Isle of Scilly, 14 November 2018 to 3 February 2019, and 17 April 2019, is being considered as the first record of this taxon.

Eastern Yellow Wagtail Motacilla tschutschensis tschutschensis

One, first-calendar-year to second-calendar-year, Sedgeford, Norfolk, 23 December 2019 to 1 March 2020, is being considered as the first record of this taxon.

Paddyfield Pipit Anthus rufulus

One, first-calendar-year or older, Sennan, Cornwall, 23 October to 14 November 2019, is being considered as the first record of this species.
